NEW YORK - ABC's Christmas treat for viewers is an evening of specials this Tuesday, Dec. 21, opening with Charles Dickens. "A Christmas Carol," at 7.30 p.m.

The essence of the spirit of Christmas, the beloved classic receives an allnew, uniquely authentic treatment. Done in animation and styled in the fashion of the 1840s, it features the voices of Sir Michael Redgrave as narrator, Alistair Sim as Scrooge, and Michael Hordern plays the troubled ghost of Marley.

"Christmas Carol" producer Richard Williams, the man responsible for the award-winning animated segments of the film "The Charge of the Light Bri-gade," explained: "We set out to do Dickens as though he and his illustrators had an animation studio in 1843. We have, in effect, become his illustrators. We were after the exact flavor of the true Dickens tale.

'It is a highly compressed version of the book," said Williams. "There isn't one word of our own. When some of the actors asked to see a script, we told

actors asked to see a script, we took
them to read the book and imagine it as
a half-hour program."

Until he began working on "A Christmas Carol," Williams had been unim

pressed with the classic because of its past re-creations. When he read the actual story, he found it "much more powerful, much less sentimental, much funnier, and more satirical."

A special in the award-winning series, "The Undersea World of Jacques Cousteau," this action-filled hour takes

viewers to the mysterious yet beautiful realm of Octopus Vulgaris—the so-called "Devil Fish."

Surely few marine creatures have received greater attention from fiction writers than the octopus. Writers of such stature as Victor Hugo and Jules Verne have related lurid tales about this singular sea creature.

And, over the years, this remark-able mollusk with its long, flexible tentacles and horny parrot-like beak has been given a sinister reputation for at-tacking divers, threatening ships, and

even killing enormous sperm whales.
On "Octopus, Octopus," Cousteau
and the crew of the research vessel
Calypso set out to separate fact from

In the Mediterranean, viewers learn

that octopi are largely small and harmless, alternately curious and shy, tending to hide in holes and caves.

But the Calypso's divers discover that there are dangerous octopi as well potentially deadly to divers and swimmers because they can cling to rocks kelp with any one of their eight sucker-studded arms and, with their other appendages hold the diver down until he drowns.

Vivid underwater scenes include a fight betwen two female octopi competing for a home in which to lay their eggs, the pulsating swimming techniquein itself a study of beauty and grace of movement - and special microscopic photography revealing the birth of young octopi breaking out of the prison of their

Through working with the octopus, feeding it and taming it, Cousteau says he is convinced that there is some communication between Man of four appendages and Mollusk of eight.

THE ABC News special, "Land of the Small," with Gregory Peck narrating, takes viewers on a fascinating journey to a seldom-seen world - the realm of the

Through the process of photomacrography, Chris Petersen Productions in association with ABC News has given viewers a unique window on the world of insects — and has provided a some-times beautiful, sometimes awesome and thoroughly startling nature documentary.

Implicit in the program is a conclusion — although insects are in almost every way entirely different from man, their societies can parallel ours, and their basic life concerns are not different at all.
