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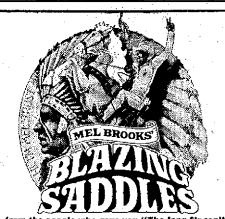

THE performances were idiomatic. The Haydn was warm, and most of the performance was accomplished. The Roussel spun an elegant web and caught in it some exquisite insect life. Lampl's stiff-armed conducting style doesn't seem promising for an impressionist work. There is nothing hazy about his movements. There is nothing in them to suggest cloudy skies or shimmer-ing landscapes. But the esults were limpid, delicate and charming.

Like Lampl, Gimpel is a musician whose early training was in Vienna. In his European view of the Brahms concerto, muscularity is complemented by the deeper strength of philosophy.

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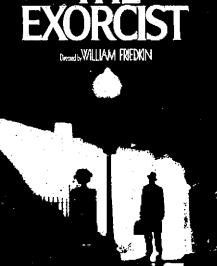
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
